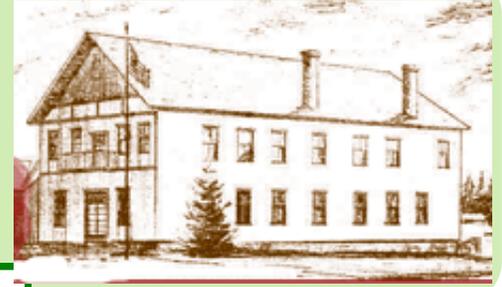



The Price County Historical Society is undertaking a major photographic archival project. Over the years the society has acquired thousands of historical photographs from individuals, families and businesses. Some have been in the form of large collections and others single photographs. Some photographs are on display at the Old Town Hall and Greenfield School Museums and others are stored in our photographic archives located at BW Papersystems. Several board members have been meeting weekly to sort, record, catalog, copy and scan these photos into our past-perfect software system.



This Price County Courthouse was built after the Phillips Fire of 1894 destroyed the old Courthouse. The Courthouse was razed when the present Courthouse was built in 1962 on this location.

As the project progresses it is the long term goal of the society to be able to have a searchable data base to enable researchers and the general public to view a version of these photographs online. In order to accomplish this, board members are taking great pains to identify and gather as much information on the photographs as possible. Once completed, photographs can be retrieved by using many different searching parameters, such as subject matter, photographer, location within the county, businesses, family name, etc.

The society currently has many photographs that we have been unable to identify. To help us in that endeavor we are planning on having copies of many of these photographs available throughout the summer at the Old Town Hall Museum. We are hoping that individuals and families visiting the museum will be able to help identify some of them. Photograph images include scenery, towns, businesses, resorts, family, events, schools, logging, farming, government and many other categories. The photographs range from the early days of Price County all the way through the 1980's. Once identified, that information will be added to the software system and will serve to greatly enhance our collection.

Identification requires much research to uncover key pieces of puzzles that are

painstakingly put together to reach a conclusion. We are fortunate that we have historical reference materials and associations from many areas in Price County, which helps tremendously in matching photographs to a certain time, place or person. This enables the gathering of additional pertinent information that can be included within the data base along with the scanned photograph. We are also fortunate that many professional photographers, families and businesses captured as much of the pictorial history of the area as they did and that they generously donated these photographs to us.

This is truly another way to preserve the history of our county for future generations and we are excited about the prospect of having the community accompany us on this mission.



Four span of horses pull this steel mounted road grader at the turn of the 20<sup>th</sup> century in the Happy Hollow area (near present Highway 8 and 111) in southern Price County, Wisconsin. Scenes similar to this were common throughout rural areas where towns kept dirt and gravel roads as accessible as possible. Some towns had access to steam powered traction engines, and upon the perfection of the gasoline-powered internal-combustion caterpillar tractor by the World War 1 era, the use of horses for such work rapidly diminished.



Thirteen Mile House on tote road to Pike Lake Chain east of Fifield, Price County, Wisconsin, ca 1920s. This structure was in use in the late 1870s through the early 1900s for loggers, travelers, and hunters.

This handwritten caption tells us a lot of information on this photograph and gives us a good start on finding out even more of the history. We know that at one time this was a filling station owned or operated by Gordon Donaldson. We know that it was located in Ogema and that it eventually was used as a library named The Book Shelf. We also have a date on



the photograph. We don't know if the photograph was taken in 1973 or if it was a library in 1973. However, using this information there may be historical resources about Ogema to consult; or there is probably someone in Ogema that still remembers the history of this building and can fill in the blanks. In the future an individual or researcher could find this photograph by searching our data base by such parameters as filling stations, libraries, family name or even year.

Without the identification information on the back of this photograph we would only have an interesting photograph of three men, one looking to be in uniform possibly holding a glass or jar of water along with a pipe that looks to have water coming out of it. You can also see barrels and pipes in the picture and what looks to be a puddle of water on the ground. Because we have the information that these


individuals were from Park Falls and know what their names and occupations were, we were able to reference "100 Years on the Flambeau" and find out the following: Frank Haasl was the Assessor from 1921-1940; Ed Coe was the Editor of the Park Falls Herald from 1930-1936 and James MacDonald was Chief of Police from 1925-1939. This more than likely dates this photograph to the 1930's as these are the years in common with Ed Coe. It also dates it to the Great Depression. Further reading from "100 years on the Flambeau" indicates that "many public works projects were completed in the city due to the New Deal Programs of the Roosevelt administration after 1933. Water projects included extension of water and sewer lines, extension of the water main down Fourth Avenue South in the summer of 1933, new wells at a site near the golf course in 1936 and the erection of a water reservoir in Lymantown." At this time we don't know the exact location of this photograph or the project, or even who took the photograph. However through the basic valuable information contained on the back of this photograph and "100 Years on the Flambeau" we were able to give much more historical value to this photograph.

This photograph of Harry D. Frokjer was part of a large collection of photographs (over 5,000) given to us by The Park Falls Herald. We are not sure when this was taken, as he looks quite young in this photograph, but does indicate that he was connected to Somerset, Wisconsin and that he was the Principal at the high school in Park Falls. In fact, Mr. Frokjer was the Principal at Lincoln High School in Park Falls. He then became Superintendent of the Park Falls School District in 1971. The Harry D. Frokjer auditorium at the present high school is named in his honor. Mr. Frokjer's wife Betteanne (Betty) Frokjer taught Physical Education and started the gymnastics program in the 1960's. This information was taken from "100 years on the Flameau." (Please



note that when photographs are scanned into the data base, both front and backs are scanned to preserve important historical information).



Editors Note: Some of you reading this article may be the official or unofficial historian for your family. I urge you to take some time and label the photographs you have. as best you can. You may be the last generation that can identify some of your family members. If this isn't done, whole generations will fade into history and become nameless images on photographic paper. I personally wish I had taken more time to sit down with my parents and grandparents to do this. I have some done, but not as much as I would like and now it is heartbreaking to know that I have pictures of relatives and locations from generations past that I can't identify. You may think that your children or grandchildren aren't interested and they may not be now, but they will be someday. Eventually everyone wants some connection to knowing where they came from. We have long winters here in northern Wisconsin and what a perfect time to start a project such as this.

## **Bicycles and Country Roads by: Laurie Pilch**

Thanks to my husband, we have many walking trails around our house. The other day as I was walking and listening to music John Denver's song "Take Me Home, Country Roads" filtered through my headphones and awakened memories of my country road, really a trail that ran past our farm. Even now when I travel that part of the road I get rushes of memories of growing up on the farm. The sound of the tractor, machinery being pulled down the road, bales of hay in the fields, walking down the trail into the woods to pick berries and riding my bike.

As a child I wanted a bicycle so bad. I remember every time we went into Nelson's Hardware Store in Park Falls just standing and staring at all the beautiful colored bikes. The one I coveted more than any other was a pink and white Schwinn 26 inch beauty with a headlight, horn and back carrier. I looked to see if it was still there every time we entered the store. I had no hopes of getting it as money for those types of new toys were simply beyond what my parents could provide, or so I thought.

The day I got off the bus on the last day of school after second grade ended was a warm and brightly lit sunny day. Soon after getting off the bus my parents told my sister and me to go over and check out the cold frames where the garden plants were

growing. We walked around the corner and there they were parked — two brand new bicycles! A bright blue Hollywood model Schwinn bike for my sister and the pink and white bike that I had gazed upon with every trip to the hardware store. I absolutely could not catch my breath. I remember crying from happiness, excitement, delight and disbelief that this bike was now mine. To this day I don't know how my parents afforded those bikes and I can't remember my sister's reaction, because all I could see was my beautiful pink and white bike through my tears and my parents hugs.

After my dad lowered the seat as far as it could go I could sit on the seat and just barely touch the pedals with the tips of my toes. I was told I would "grow into it," You grew into lots of things in those days, such as clothes, skates, shoes; so that didn't phase me. Within a few days and a few spills and no training wheels, I had learned how to ride my bike, master the coaster brake, use the horn and had even ridden at night to try out the light. This all occurred in our driveway. I was now ready to expand my horizons and navigate the hill by our driveway and take my first ride away from the farm down our road. It was an exhilarating experience seeing how fast I could pedal and then hop back up on the seat and coast for a while. My bike gave me independence, freedom and the ability to venture from the farm on my own. It provided

me a means to strap on a book to the back carrier and take a sandwich and find a place in the pine plantation just off our road to read. It provided me a way to go down our road to Sailor Creek Flowage to go for a swim. It gave me time with friends when we all rode our bikes together. It also taught me how to oil chains, pump up tires, polish chrome and heed my father's instructions, that the bike "must not be tossed on its side, left out in rain storms and had to be put in the garage every night. " My parents were also ultimately right that I did, by the following summer, "grow into" my bike and over the years the seat was risen as high as it could go.

Listening to that song, which talks about country roads, memories and roads leading home made me realize that everyone has country roads leading home; whether they be city blocks walked with friends or actual back country roads, or roads and memories meandering in your mind.

I still have my bike. I don't know if I will ride it again or not, but every time I look at it I see that little girl barely able to touch the pedals sailing down our country farm road, so happy and free with pure joy in her face. I feel the love of my parents and family and I am struck with such a sense of peace and contentment. My parents just didn't buy me a bicycle that day, they gave me a road to independence, responsibility and a direction to find my way home no matter where that may be. May you also find some pleasant country roads on your journey.
